





St Mary's Church News

he village of Hemyock has for the first time in living memory had a bare ten foot cross erected in the churchyard during Holy Week but by Easter Sunday it had been decorated with a floral display by Monica Smith, St Mary's Church flower arranger co ordinator.

The congregations of the Upper Culm Mission Community were able to take part in a virtual service on Good Friday and a half hour reflection took place on Easter Sunday. Other similar connections were available during Holy Week.

The Parish Pump is a popular magazine produced by St Mary's Church and distributed to every household in Hemyock and Clayhidon six times a year. Due to the risk of infection and other concerns it was decided to issue the April/May copy online only. As not all folk in the community have internet access a hard copy practical mini guide to what is available locally without leaving home has been printed.

Thanks to an army of volunteers this has now been distributed and every street or estate in the villages has a named person willing to provide help. The mini guide includes a list of businesses who provide groceries and provisions, home delivered ready made meals, household essentials, pets and Vets as well as information from the Blackdown Medical Practice, churches and other support bodies.

Children are being invited to drop a letter or drawing into the red postbox now outside of St Mary's Church and these will later be collected and distributed throughout the village. It is suggested an adult puts the contribution through the opening.

Toilets

ot again surely? Well no, but yes. You will recall that in 2018 after about 900 years St Mary's opened it's first toilets; many of you helped towards the cost of them, for which many thanks. At the end of last year following the completion of the project and winding up of the account it was suggested to the PCC that it would be a good idea to have it twinned. No that does not mean building an identical one at the other end of the church but rather joining a scheme run by the charity "Tear Fund". This "twins" toilets in this country with one in a less developed one. It's like twinning with French villages but on a smaller scale.

Tear Fund work in about 40 countries across the world, including Uganda. Regular readers will recall that St Mary's has a link with Uganda in the form of "The Potter's Village",a hospital for Children on the edge of Kisoro in South west Uganda. So we applied and asked if possible can it be near Kisoro"

Tearfund accepted our offer and have twinned us with a latrine in the Kabale area. Kabale is the next large township to the east of Kisoro and is about 48 miles away, an hour and a quarter along a very twisty road. It is an area which staff from Potter's Village visit.

Now mention of the word latrine may just bring to mind thought of dirty smelly "sheds" in the back streets of some small French town. In which case can I ask you to think again. Latrine technology is definitely in the 21st century. There are your basic models, but then there's twin chamber models, compost producing ones, ventilated versions and yes even ones with running water. Have a look at the "Toilet Twinning" website for the whole technical breakdown.

So why does all this matter? Because lack of sanitation and good hygiene kill. And Tearfund don't just come along, put up a loo and swan off. They will meet with the local community and educate people to understand the dangers of poor sanitation and hygiene. Surprisingly many Mothers don't realise that the water they spent 4hours doing to get is the main reason their children have diarrhea. It's contaminated with all sorts of bugs and animal urine.

It means in most cases that the community choose the site and the type of unit, and may well build it themselves, and then look after it. So what do they get for their involvement. Where possible a water supply is brought to the area. This will be filtered and so clean. So less illness, especially for children who then do not miss out on schooling. So better long term prospects The women aren't spending hours away from their homes so can be more productive in their gardens, so better food. Crops can be watered.

Good hygiene practices can be taught and followed, so less illness. Also for women the fear of being attacked or raped whilst attending to their toilet in the bush or forest is removed, especially where the toilet/latrine is just for the one family.

So lots of benefits, for a small outlay. Which incidentally gets mainly spent on the individual education and discussions before work starts. And you could have your loo twinned too. Or your tap. Do look up the "ToiletTwinning" website. It's quite fascinating. And if you want to know where our twin is, it is at Latitude 1.1955 south, Longitude 29.981 east.

PS They do also twin "Toilet blocks" like you find in village halls or sports facilities or schools etc.

VE Day Celebrations

E Day75 began in Hemyock with a wreath being laid at the War memorial by RBL Poppy Organiser David Bawler. As churches were not allowed to fly flags from towers a temporary pole was erected at St Mary's and the Union flag hoisted. Friends and neighbours met outside for the 2 minutes silence at 11am and again for the singing of We'll Meet Again.

Numerous houses had been decorated with bunting and other displays and keeping in mind social distancing many outdoor celebrations were held. On the Eastlands estate Matt Atteo, a Scout leader, ensured his neighbours had bunting erected. At Castle Park a young family were asked to turn their V E Day music up for others to enjoy and dance to. At South View a tea party was held using vintage crockery, surrounded by union flags whilst music from the 1940s was enjoyed.

Church Tower

id you know that the Church of England has a system for checking the state of its church buildings? Called the Quinquennial Survey it involves a survey of the building every 5 years. Culm Davy and St Mary's are due to be done this year. However at St Mary's one bit has already had a detailed examination.

Back in the mid 1850s Hemyock had 5 bells. It has had this number at least since 1553. The Wardens of the time wanted a sixth. They appealed to the village for funds to pay for the bell they rather rashly had ordered. (Churchwardens could do all sorts of things years ago including imposing "rates") The money did not flood in: so one warden cancelled the order, which was with Mears and Stainback at the famous Whitechapel foundry (They had recently recast the tenor) The other warden was not pleased at this and promptly came up with the rest of the money required. So in 1858 we had a 6th bell, a new treble. The 5 existing bells were quite snuggly fitted in the tower in a single layer, so the bellhanger fitted the bell above the rest on a separate frame.

Fast forward nearly 50 years and the ringers were saying that the bells were not going well, so the council of the experts was to have them rehung in a new frame. The contract for doing this was given to Harry Stokes of Woodbury, Devon. Harry was well known in Devon ringing circles and known to use non traditional materials - no oak beams, metal ones!

Harry's solution for Hemyock was quite ingenious He did use oak, but in the clock room not the bell chamber. Those of you who've climbed upon Heritage weekends will recall the large timber beams there, which just rest on the Norman walls below. When built about1120/30 the tower was in the centre of a cruciform shaped church and the Normans had produced rather thick walls (look at the arches in the ringing room) Above the top beam Harry did use a metal frame. So all the weight of the bells (just under 4 tons) was taken by the Norman walls and the frame was not attached to the rest of the tower. Except for the treble. He replicated the design of the frame and put the beams holding the treble into the wall and sealed them in.

Now those of you who have been doing year 8 science with your children of late will know that having metal sitting in a wet substance is not a good idea, and for most of the past 110 years Hemyock's tower has been WET.

Things did alter in the 1980s when the outside was sprayed with silicone and things started to dry out. They dried out that well that solid areas started to turn to something like dust. Then it was noted about 3 years ago that where the beams supporting the treble entered the walls cracks were beginning to radiate out. This is often caused by the metal "expanding" due to the formation of rust. We called in the Diocesan Bells advisor who summed up his findings by saying "dig the beams out and have a detailed look at them"

At the time we were very much involved in the plans for the toilet block so such work had to wait. But now its time has come and the Church architect was called in to look at the whole tower. The list he has come up with is quite long. It includes:

- Supporting the treble and checking the beams.
- Removing odd pieces of metal in the walls and replacing by stainless steel
- Repointing the bell chamber walls and removing wrongly applied cement.
- Refixing the clock supports
- Refreshing the louvres
- Cleaning the clockroom walls and re-instating the missing window
- Checking the undersides of the arches in the ringing
- Redecorating the ringing room and quite a few small jobs.

All this will take time, patience, specialised help and quite a few pennies, and as far as the Ringers are concerned, having to stop ringing again.

We will keep you informed of our progress.

Accompanied recently by Mary Beard, Geoff has carried out occasional small repairs or renovations, and even well into his nineties has regularly been seen climbing stepladders or moving hall furniture of cleaning equipment.

It's fair to say that Geoff has occasionally been exasperated by the hall management committee, especially when changes have been made that were not necessarily seen as improvements, but the committee in all it's personnel permutations over the years have always found Geoff to be a willing and cooperative servant, and would like to thank Geoff (and Mary) for the many years of dedicated service. We'll all miss seeing them in the hall each day, but hope to see them both around the village for many years to come.

Devon countryside charity's 2020 competitions provide a creative outlet for stay-at-home schoolchildren

¬he Devon branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England hopes its 2020 art and writing competitions, open for entries from 18 May, will provide a creative outlet for primary schoolchildren across the county, many of whom are spending more time than usual indoors this spring because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

CPRE Devon's two children's competitions are a fun way to encourage youngsters to engage with the great outdoors, even if they themselves are stuck indoors! Children in Key Stages 1 and 2 are urged to use their imagination to create a piece of artwork or a short piece of writing evoking Devon's coast or countryside, or a favourite spot that's important to them. It could be a local park, a green space nearby, somewhere they have visited for a day out or even their own garden.

The closing date for entries is 30 June 2020.

Last year the charity received fantastic entries from right across the county from girls and boys in KS1 and KS2, who had captured their favourite outdoor space on paper. Pencils, pens, paints and sticking paste were all put to use to create artworks which showed the beauty and variety of Devon's natural environment.

The competitions are simple to enter. A top prize will be awarded to individual children in each key stage, as well as to their school. All entrants will receive a CPRE Devon 'Barney the Bull' gift. The top entrants from each school will win a Devon Countryside Ambassador Badge and a framed certificate. Winning schools will receive a plaque and £200 to spend on outdoor learning as well as CPRE membership for a year.

s I write this at the end of May, the club would normally have opened six weeks ago, but we are just on the cusp of a Livery limited opening now. It has been a strange couple of months for us all! Fortunately, as I understand, there have been very few cases of Covid 19 in Hemyock, and to the best of my knowledge, no sad deaths. With regard to club members, I know of no-one who has succumbed. Let us all hope this continues as Covid rumbles on in future.

As far as the club is concerned, everything was progressing normally with winter care of the green, and then suddenly with lockdown, there were a number of e-mails from Bowls England telling us what we could and could not do to comply with government rules. In short, green maintenance was reduced to a basic level which prevented serious deterioration of the playing surface, and which would allow for its restoration in due course. Instead of working as a team and enjoying a coffee break together, we worked largely in isolation, with one member of the team completing one job, and another then taking over to do the next, whilst the first volunteer went home. Despite the difficulties, the green has survived, and after we were given official permission to re-start limited bowling on May 13th, we have worked to get the green back into shape, although not quite to the excellent standards of the last couple of years, and bowling in a very restricted form, with full protective procedures commenced on May 30th.

We owe an apology to anyone who planned to attend our open day on April 20th. This was obviously impossible. However, if anyone who has developed lockdown fever, or who simply would like to enjoy a good game and (usually) good a social environment, and would like to try their hand, just contact a club member.

This strange season, there are no league matches envisaged, no county competitions or team matches of any description. Only practice "rollups" are allowed, with a maximum of six members on the green at any one time, and all sessions to be pre-booked to avoid accidental congestion. The clubhouse remains completely closed.

The lockdown will have a massive effect on the clubs limited finances, but thanks to a government grant administered by Mid –Devon council, for which we are very grateful, the worst case scenario has been avoided, and the club will survive without question, and we look forward to a return to normal activity next year if not before.

Ultimately, we should all be grateful that Hemyock appears to have avoided the worst of Covid so far. Long may it continue! Stay safe, with best wishes to all from HBC.

BLACKDOWN SUPPORT GROUP – LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

s for all of us, individuals and organisations alike, the last 2 months at the BSG has been a time we will never forget. It seems a lifetime ago, in early March, that we started thinking very seriously about how we were going to be affected by Covid-19 and how we could best support those who would need the most help.

Since then, all of our lives have been turned upside down, but we are hugely fortunate to be part of such resilient and supportive communities in the Blackdowns, which have risen to the challenges we have collectively faced in an impressive and humbling way.

Working with Parish Councils, Churches and community groups across the area, we have seen a huge response to our requests for volunteer support with shopping, prescription deliveries and telephone befriending for those who are self-isolating.

Over 200 new volunteers came forward across the parishes of Clayhidon, Culmstock, Hemyock, Dunkeswell, Churchinford, Otterford and Buckland St Mary to offer their help in the early stages of the crisis and we are hugely grateful for that response – thank you to all of those people. This is twice the total number of volunteers we normally work with across the entire Blackdown Hills area and we hope that some of those people will be able to become long-term BSG volunteers as we move forward with re-establishing some of our normal services in the future.

We estimate that in the 6 weeks from mid March to the end of April, volunteers across the 3 Parishes of Hemyock, Culmstock and Clayhidon delivered 690 prescriptions, did 475 shopping trips and made 1700 welfare check telephone calls. These activities are continuing to take place across the Blackdowns.

The number of Coronavirus cases locally has been mercifully low so far compared to some parts of the country and we have not had the need to call on everyone who offered their services as a Volunteer. We thank those people for their enthusiasm and we hope that our beautiful area continues to stay healthy in the weeks and months to come as lockdown restrictions ease. Whatever the outcome of all this, we are grateful to know that our communities are ready to support each other.

The speedy and substantial volunteer response from the community meant that we could offer co-ordinated volunteer support to the Blackdown Practice, to enable them to move very quickly to 100% prescription delivery across the entire Practice catchment area. This has been enormously helpful in reducing unnecessary journeys for patients and reducing footfall and risk of infection at the Practice sites.

A Friendly Call

Blackdown Support Group Lunch Club Volunteers are carrying out regular ring-rounds to our usual Lunch Club guests. Our Befriending Volunteers continue to call those they would usually visit face to face. We also have Volunteers with specialist skills in certain areas such as mental health, dementia, bereavement and form filling who are able to offer telephone support – please get in touch if you or someone you know might benefit from this.

Transport

We are now looking at how we can safely re-start our medical transport service, to enable people who do not drive to get to important or critical medical appointments, which may have been postponed during the crisis. At present we are able to offer transport to **medical appointments only**, to people who are not in the "shielded/extremely vulnerable" category and who are able to complete their journey physically unaided. If you would like to make a booking for transport to a medical appointment or if you are in the shielded category or unable to make a journey unaided and need advice on your transport options, you can call us on the usual number – 01823 681 036 Monday to Friday between 9 and 11am.

Volunteer Opportunities

As the frequency of medical appointments begins to increase, we are seeking new Volunteer Drivers to join the BSG at a time when many of our regular drivers are unable to help. This role



emyock being Hemyock has proved once again, during the past challenging weeks, what a wonderful caring parish it is. As I have been confined to barracks throughout the lockdown I have experienced first hand the love of family and the support from neighbours.

Volunteers have shopped, prescriptions have been delivered, social media and phone calls have been used to make contact whether to check others are well or informing them of supermarket slots! Our local businesses and churches along with the Blackdown Practice, BSG and school have continued to support the community in many different ways, the weekly Clap for Carers has seen households standing on their doorstep applauding and rainbow pictures and teddy bears have appeared in windows. We have been fortunate that our bins have been emptied, our post and milk delivered and the glorious weather has meant that most of us have been able to be outside whether in our gardens or going for walks. We are also aware that key workers have often gone into difficult environments and we are grateful for them and all they have done and continue to do.

During this difficult time we are aware that some families have lost a loved one including Ena Sutton (nee Cload), Barbara Hole, Elizabeth Cheshire, Mair Northam and Elaine Moralee. We send condolences and prayers to those concerned.

Ena Sutton nee Cload, married Geoff later in life. Ena Lived and worked on the family farm at Dunns Green. Following her fathers death she moved into Hemyock eventually moving into Castle Park. She will be remembered by many older long term residents and for her cheerful laughter.

Barbara Hole

Until going into care had lived here all her life here, at Millhayes and later moving to Castle Park. Barbara's working life was spent at the milk factory offices. Barbara was an enthusiastic member of the pantomimes which were put on at the factory in the 1940/50s. As one of the earliest Girl Guides here she later went on to run the Brownies in the 1940's until her retirement in 1968 when I took over. On her retirement she was very involved with the Over 60s group. In the 1970's, Barbara was a volunteer delivering the Yours magazine to more senior village residents. The now well known magazine was originally a free newspaper created for Help the Aged charity. Barbara was a keen whist player and a very skilled knitter making numerous animals and dolls for charity including Christian Response to Eastern Europe.

Mair Northam

Mair moved to Hemyock in the late 1940's when she lived in Station Road. She married Gordon Northam (Barbara Bowden brother) and moved to Wales. They had no children and on Gordon's retirement the couple returned to live in Hemyock but sadly he died within 3 weeks of their arrival. Mair was quiet by nature but she enjoyed cruising and belonged to the ballroom dancing club here.

Elizabeth(Libby) Cheshire

Libby grew up in Edgeware, near London and, although she wasn't from a farming family, became a land girl during the war and married Don who was determined to become a farmer, despite having no farm to inherit. Through sheer hard work and determination they worked their way up from farm management in Oxfordshire, through farm tenancies on the Isle of Wight and

finally farm ownership in Cornwall. It was quite a struggle at times, but they made a great team, raising three girls along the way and giving them a wonderful childhood.

Libby came to live with her daughter Julie and son-in-law Paul at Cheritons in 2009 and her whole family would like to thank the Hemyock community for the warm welcome given to her. She joined a number of clubs, and was often roped in to provide refreshments for the tennis club. Most people in the village who knew her will have tasted her cooking. She loved to bake and there were always cakes, biscuits or puddings on the go at Cheritons (often all three). This didn't help our waistlines, but they were very good! Thank you for the many cards and warm words that we have received; they have been particularly welcome in these strange times.

Elaine Moralee

Many were shocked by the sudden and tragic death of Elaine after a fall. She was a much loved member of our community who worked within the medical profession and was involved with amongst other things Valley Arts. Elaine's popularity was such that many of her friends and neighbours lined the streets as her hearse passed through the village as due to present restrictions they were unable to attend her service.

As the last issue of the Pump was printed online and you may not have had access to it there were three folk mentioned who had received awards so it has been decided to include their details here along with our congratulations.

Julie Jennings

Many will know her through the immense work she has done with Hemyock Cubs and other groups in the area over many years. Her Award for Merit for Outstanding Service to Scouting was presented by two of her grandchildren much to Julie's delight. Thank you Julie for all you have done and continue to do.

Elizabeth Sherwood

Lizzie, wife of Rev David a previous Rector here, first became involved with disability access as a 6th form volunteer. She has worked at Exeter university for 20 years where she is the team leader helping assess students who require support. She received the Rigour Professional Services Recognition Award.

Rebekah Bawler

Has been recognised as one of the 23 top technology educators in the UK by The Education Foundation Edtech 50. She advises schools across 5 Local Authorities in South Wales where she is a Lead Teacher in ICT. Rebekah recently attended a 4 day event in London for educators from around the world where she was on a discussion panel.

It was very good to hear that **Roger Lambert** had been discharged from hospital. He had been very ill with Coronavirus. We wish well in his recovery. Other people who have been brought to the attention of the Pump as being unwell include **Ron, Janet, Gordon, Chris, Wendy, Kay, Les and Tony**. We send them, and anyone known to us, all good wishes.

VE Day75... not quite what we nor the country planned! Even so many mini celebrations took place here. A wreath and poppies were placed on the War Memorial with a Union flag hoisted

on a temporary pole alongside as religious buildings were not allowed to fly one. Bunting, flags and balloons appeared around the village as houses were decorated and keeping a safe distance apart numerous gatherings took place as well as those in individual gardens. Many stood outside at 11am as the 2 minute silence was observed and 9pm voices were heard singing We'll Meet Again.

This was all so different to The Celebration of Peace weekend organised by the then Carnival Committee and held to commemorate the 50th anniversary of VE Day. The Pump reminds us of the laying of a wreath at the War Memorial followed by an open air service at the Parish Hall car park with music supplied by Wellington School Combined Cadet Force band, primary age children were presented with commemorative coins, a fete with Taunton Hospital radio providing music and interviews with veterans, a1940s style dance with live music, an open air concert and street party plus a display of wartime memorabilia.... all blessed with fine weather. The plaque alongside the War Memorial was laid and the small garden behind it was planted with roses as was one at the front of the Baptist Chapel and a garden at the school. A certificate which hangs in St Mary's was presented by the Royal British Legion in thanks for the money raised over the weekend.

In 2005, the **60th anniversary** saw another open air service despite the blustery conditions. It was led by Rev David Sherwood assisted by Pastor Steven Reed and followed with a bring and share tea when music from the war years was played and dancing to the music of Glenn Miller was enjoyed. The Royal British Legion WW2 Anniversary Appeal benefited with a donation of £150.

At that time **Rev Sherwood** wrote in the Pump that "Our memories are important to us. In them we store our good times and the bad. We need to be constantly reminded of the good things in life. We need to be shown that we are loved and the people around us care for us and want to be close to us" words so relevant to the situation we have been in for many weeks.

Peter and Susan Barrett will be celebrating their Diamond wedding anniversary on 18th June. We send them the very warmest congratulations.

When was the first Pump was printed and when did I start writing this column were two questions recently asked. The magazine was begun by the then Rector, Rev Tony Grosse. At the great age of nearly 90 he couldn't remember but felt it would have been in the early 1970s. (we think 1972) He retired after over 22 years here and 136 copies had been printed during that time mainly written by him, rolled out from a word processor and put together by a group of us sat around a table at The Rectory. I started writing this column in the June/July issue 1996.

The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

their bathroom to be modernised to enable them to continue to live at home; another patient who needed a chair that would help them in getting in and out without assistance. Another example is a patient who had severe back pain and a grant was given for them to have remedial massage.

If you feel the Trust can help you we would suggest you talk to your GP or any person who gives you support and submit an Application form which can be found online or pick one up from any of the Blackdown Practice surgeries. The Trustees are proud of the speed with which they are able to help patients and in many cases are able to provide financial assistance within two weeks.

Business Update June 2020

Due to the coronavirus outbreak the parish council did not meet during April and following changes to legislation it was able to hold its first remote meeting using Zoom in May. A brief summary of the business conducted at that meeting is as follows:-

Planning

Applications received for:-

- ◆ 20/00539/FULL. Retention of container housing biomass boiler (Container A) and repositioning of existing container housing biomass boiler (Container B). Brookridge Timber Ltd, Hemyock.
- 20/00452/MOUT. Outline for the erection of up to 140 dwellings. Blackwater Road, Culmstock.
- Permission granted noted for:-
- 20/00260/CLU. Certificate of lawfulness for existing use of barn and stables as residential dwelling for a period in excess of 4 years.
- 20/00548/PNAG. Prior notification for the erection of extension to an agricultural livestock building, Scotland Farm.
- Refusal noted for:-
- 20/00015/FULL. Erection of dwelling following demolition of garage. 29 Station Road.

Finance

Income - included cemetery payments, interest, donations towards tree planting, wayleave payment and precept. Expenditure - included room hire, clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, toilet cleaning and consumables, subscriptions, electricity, water, legal fees and planning fees.


Longmead

The bridge over the brook at the northern end of the football fields is in need of refurbishment. Brookridge Timber Ltd has kindly agreed to remove it and refurbish it. Whilst the bridge is undergoing repair, contractors will be on site making improvements to help preserve the newly refurbished bridge and the path will need to be diverted along the side of the football pitches. There will be no access across the brook. Please bear with us whilst this essential work is undertaken.

The existing play area at Longmead is being redesigned. We hope to have the new equipment installed within the next few months.

Wild Flower Seeds

Following a grant from the Blackdown Hills Transition Group, a team of volunteers has planted some meadow flower seeds on verges leading into the village.

Hedges

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges in and around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

Highways

A private arrangement meant jobs could be done at the new address before completion so father and daughter made countless journeys between the two properties, making the actual move much easier when it did actually happen.

So Lockdown happened and Anita was able to keep her parents as safe as she could by doing the shopping, thus keeping them out of the shops.

We tried different methods of shopping. A 'click and collect' was not a great success as the 'Calcraft order' was given to someone else who was nearly back home before being asked to come back to the shop! Cullompton market Traders did really well and we were able to enjoy really local products. Never seen such huge potatoes! Anita has enjoyed shopping locally too.

The official moving date arrived and the removal van arrived to transfer our belongings about half a mile up the village. The weather has been warm and dry. Not ideal for creating a new garden but good for all the outside jobs.

Anita's presence has been a great asset and Roy has been allowed to chauffeur her around! We have not had any of our three daughters living with us for 32 years but now, ten weeks later, she is still with us and no sign as yet of her returning to Abu Dhabi!

Socially Distanced Repair Work to Much Loved Monument Continues

espite needing to ensure building work is carried out in a socially distant way, vital restoration work on the Wellington Monument in Somerset, has successfully continued.

Throughout its 200 years the Wellington Monument has had a turbulent history. With false starts in its construction, failing repairs and a lack of funds, the structure has struggled to stay in a good state of repair. Deterioration and the danger of falling masonry led to the building being closed and a fence erected.

However, at the end of 2019, a major conservation project got underway. Current global circumstances could have meant the restoration would once again be halted.

Mark Holland, Site Manager for Sally Strachey Conservation commented, 'We've been dismantling the pyramidion (the top section) and now the counterweight and rusting iron assembly have been dismantled and are now stored at ground level, alongside the stone from the pyramidion.'

Mark continued: 'This week we have started on the first batch of anchor-ties (which help to strengthen the structure), they are all located on the lower third. Once this phase is complete, we will be starting with the cavity grouting; trials for this will commence next week. We will then continue upward, grouting all voids in one metre increments. Currently the team of six stone masons have replaced about 80 stones.'

Helen Sharp, Project Manager for the Trust added, 'We are grateful to the community for their continued support of the project during these unusual times. We want to make sure they know that we continue to commit to looking after Wellington Monument.'

The project to repair the monument will cost £3.45m, with funding received from grant-giving bodies, and donors. It is also with thanks to the community who have also been very generous with their donations that the National Trust have raised a total of £2.95m.

Rebecca Pow, MP for Taunton Deane said, 'I have been involved with this project from the outset having secured initial funding from the Libor Fund of £1m. This is a very challenging project and has been made even more so during the pandemic, but the National Trust and the contractor have made it possible to progress the work following all the correct measures, which is a testament to their skills and dedication. I would like to thank all those who have been involved in furthering this project in a range of ways and those who have made donations so that the restoration of this iconic Monument is possible. It's a real symbol for the area heralding the gateway to the South West. I pledged to work to restore the Monument when I was first elected and am delighted that working with the National Trust and the local community, we are nearing our goal.'

Dear Residents

ow things have changed. We have never seen anything like the COVID-19, it has brought disruption and everything almost a stop. I have not been to any Parish Council or even Devon County meetings since early March. Because of the lockdown all meetings have been cancelled or postponed. We are now doing meetings by video link and we are now getting the hang of it. Although I must say, I have had more emails to deal with now, than I ever did before the pandemic, keep them coming.

County from time to time keep us updated with information, but that can easily get out of date, by the time you get this report, for sure things could well have altered. Below I have outlined some of what has or will be happening.

Intelligence such as the traffic flows, as well as traffic speed (which sadly is not reducing) is being shared with the police daily to assist them wherever possible. With the pressures on other parts of the organisation, some of the staff have volunteered to assist elsewhere, which the service is supporting, maintaining enough staff to keep the highway operating safely, as well as preparing for supporting the Devon economy, when the time is right. You may have seen the news about the Civil Parking Enforcement Officers helping with the food distribution, which Skanska had also assisted with.

Applications can now be made for support from the Bounce Back Loans scheme which has been set up to enable small and medium-sized businesses affected by coronavirus to access loans of up to £50,000. UK-based businesses negatively affected by coronavirus can borrow between £2,000 and £50,000. The government guarantees 100% of the loan and there won't be any fees or interest to pay for the first 12 months. Loan terms will be up to 6 years. No repayments will be due during the first 12 months. The government will work with lenders to agree a low rate of interest for the remaining period of the loan.

Full details of the scheme, including details of the accredited lenders who are administering it, can be found on the website of the British Business Bank.

At Devon County Council we are beginning to think ahead about what the 'new normal' might look like for us. We have shown over the past weeks how adaptable we are and that we can continue to deliver vital services and protect the most vulnerable in our communities in extraordinary circumstances. We will of course continue to review all our working arrangements for Members and staff as Government guidance emerges but for now, please keep going; please keep working from home if you can; and most of all, please keep safe.

I have been in contact with Phil Morgan to get an update. Phil is out and about doing his normal work as is Skanska. He is monitoring all the roads in his/our patch under what is called 'Doing what matters', this is a process which evaluates road conditions, not necessary just potholes. Any potholes that has been reported will be repaired according to the status of the road, he says Skanska is using their imagination more now and not waiting for a pothole to reach the required measurements before giving it some attention.

What he is doing with all the roads, he and his counterparts

in other parts of the County, have to classify the condition of the road, 1 to 5, 1 being OK and 5 not drivable. The roads that he has assessed in our area are falling in the 1 to 2 area, i.e., not too bad, that is not to say some are needing more attention than others, we haven't got any that are between 3 to 5. If of course you feel there are some which you feel does fall 3 or over, please let me/us know. Of course you and I do not know what a road with a 2, looks like. There is some hold up with roads that require hot tar, because the hot tar plant is in lockdown. Quarries are still working with the isolation and 2 metre rule, which is slowing down production of stone/sand. Any maintenance that is being done is under the isolation separation order, keeping at least 2 metres apart. Footpaths and tree inspections/work are able to carry on, any work that needs to be done, can be, providing they work within the 2 metre rule.

With the very dry April this has helped pothole filling and other road maintenance as well as traffic flows which are considered to be the level they were back in the fifties and sixties, of course this won't last when the restrictions are lifted. If you need any help, or not sure where to go for it, just contact me via the phone or email, if I can be of any help or point you the right direction, I will. But most of all, stay safe, you know where I am.

Council pledges to do everything in its power to help people through the crisis

evon County Council Leader John Hart today pledged the authority will do whatever it can to support residents and communities through the Coronavirus outbreak.

"This is an unprecedented situation and many residents will be deeply worried about themselves, their families and how they are going to cope over the coming weeks," he said.

"I want to assure everyone that the whole council is working flat out alongside our partners in the NHS, districts and others to make sure we put everything we can in place to help people through this. We will do everything it takes to keep our care system fully functioning and ease the immense pressure our hospitals are facing.

We are working with schools, nurseries and colleges to provide the care and support our key workers need to continue in their vital roles. We will redeploy our own staff and resources as necessary to help keep essential services up and running. And we will work with the Local Enterprise Partnership to support and advise local businesses via the Growth Hub as best we can.

Our people and communities are already demonstrating the strong community spirit which has helped us through previous crises.

All across the County, town and parish councils and community groups are setting up volunteer schemes to keep an eye on their more vulnerable neighbours. I know many of us who remain healthy and mobile are already offering our support and I urge more people to do the same.

Other actions include:

- The physical closure of library buildings to the public and suspension of mobile library services and events. Loan periods are being relaxed and access to digital books is being extended.
- A relaxation of rules relating to bus passes to enable older people to access shops before 9.30 and enable people to take advantage of dedicated shopping times for older people being offered by some supermarkets.

Details of other specific actions and changes to services will be announced over the coming days and weeks.



Many comments have been made to the council about hedges around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

From time to time the parish council employs people to carry out tasks on its behalf. These tasks range from repairing a wall, improving and repairing footpaths, gates and bridges, clearing ditches, and other general maintenance works. News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

hurch on the hills, like everywhere, has undergone a rather radical transformation in recent months. We have been presented with many challenges, and yet also many opportunities. The church sits empty and yet remains mobilised. We are reminded in these days that the church is far more than a building – it is a body! It is a people brought together by the redeeming love of Jesus.

Prior to lockdown and the closing of the church building, as a fellowship, we had commenced a series looking at the book of Acts. The first Sunday we couldn't be together, as we met online, our subject for studying came from Acts 2:42-47. We reflected upon the 'Fellowship of Believers' – and asked the question, 'what it is to be church?' God's Word, as always, was a rich blessing as the pattern of the early church established a fitting pattern for us to be reminded of in these days:

We are entering a season in which church will not feel like it has before, but perhaps like never before, we can be church in the way Christ has truly called us... In these days, rooted in Christ and empowered by the Spirit, may we be devoted to his word, to one another, to remembering the atoning work of Christ and, turning to him in prayer, knowing that he has overcome the world.

(Excerpt from the RML sermon on Sunday 22nd March)

Over the weeks that followed we got up to speed with the technology and began broadcasting each Sunday morning via our YouTube channel. We, like so many others, discovered what it is to 'zoom' and began to meet together online to continue our midweek bible study and pray together. For those not online, sermons were put on CDs to ensure that none were excluded, and the phone remained a wonderful tool by which we could, and still can, care for one another and break the burden of isolation.

Encouragements readily came for which we give thanks to the Lord. Though plans for Easter weekend were much changed, we still met around the Word and had a time of communion on Easter Sunday evening led by David Needle. We contemplated our unity in the Lord Jesus Christ who, through His atoning work on the cross, the putting away of sin for those who would turn to him, has made us sons and daughters of the living God – we are adopted into His family. This is a unity that transcends the distance put between us by Covid-19. This was only amplified when we were joined on line by the daughter of one of the fellowship at Rosemary Lane, all the way from Bahrain.

I have been delighted to speak to members of the fellowship and wider community who would tell me of all the people they had spoken to that day on the phone. These are not isolated incidents but a pattern of love that has continued throughout the past months – time and time again we have witnessed a care and concern for neighbours, even where relationships prior to the pandemic were non-existent. We have had opportunities to serve one another in new ways, pray for one another and support one another.

However, there remain those, for whom this time is increasingly difficult, I have sat and listened to people weep over the phone because they are struggling and cannot see

beyond the present isolation. Uncertainty is deeply unsettling! The last few months have thrust us into a sense of uncertainty like we have never before experienced for a generation, and as we look ahead, much remains uncertain: The return to schools, the return to work, the way we will go about things in a world where distancing, shielding and isolating are terms that have entered our common vernacular. We are conscious that as a community there will be people who, because of this pandemic, are frustrated, fearful, losing hope and facing the reality of death either through personal loss, or through observing the rising death toll nationally and globally. The statistics, of course, can hide the painful reality that thousands more mourn and feel the loss of a mother, father, brother, sister, grandparent or friend.

And yet, I believe the church carries a message – the gospel – which offers each person the opportunity to find certainty, to find something, someone, rock solid. Someone who can provide hope that will never diminish, even in the face of death. Hope that comes as a soothing balm to the buffeted soul. This hope exists because Jesus has dealt with our sin and the removed the power and fear of death, and all by way of his own death and resurrection:

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time.

At the conclusion of our first online sermon from Acts 2:42-47, mentioned above, we shared in the words from a hymn we often sing – words that remind us of the antidote to the uncertainty of this world – it is the sure and certain hope that is found only in Jesus Christ, God the Son:

In Christ alone my hope is found,
He is my light, my strength, my song
This Cornerstone, this solid Ground
Firm through the fiercest drought and storm.
What heights of love, what depths of peace
When fears are stilled, when strivings cease
My Comforter, my All in All
Here in the love of Christ I stand.

Torking with wheat reed often makes us cough. The thrashing is a dusty old process, and on a dry day you can see a puff of dust out of the top of each bundle when you tap it down against the ground, before trimming it for use on the roof. Daisy who is sensible, wears a mask, and I just cough and grumble about it.

Nearly a month later, I'm well; the girls didn't get it, thank goodness...but my lungs have taken a good battering, and the GP says it'll take several weeks before I can expect to feel anywhere near normal again. I'm learning to do 'respiratory physiotherapy' exercises ...never knew such a thing existed! I thought huffing was reserved for the 3 little pigs, but it turns out it's a good way to begin to empty your lungs of the stuff that shouldn't be in there.

I've got to say that the help we received from Ruth, Mandy and the volunteers at Churchinford Village Shop, our friends who picked up shopping and delivered to our doorstep... was outstanding. Thank you. The speed with which the shop team adjusted to the crisis, both in managing and acquiring stock, to protecting staff and customers has been inspiring. We are incredibly lucky to have the shop in our parish, and we are more than usually thankful for it.
